

The Saudi army chief met with his Iranian counterpart in Tehran, a rare move praised by Iranian media as the first of its kind in years, considering it a step towards enhancing defense diplomacy. This visit followed a phone conversation between Iran's army chief and the Saudi defense minister last December, during which both sides agreed to strengthen defense and security cooperation in the Gulf region. Both countries seem eager to reduce tensions and expand cooperation within the framework of the agreement signed in China last year. Moreover, Iran seemingly aims to leverage its improved relations with Saudi Arabia to deepen cooperation with the Gulf countries, recognizing Saudi Arabia's pivotal role in the Gulf Cooperation Council. Tehran's concerns over the future policies of US President-elect

Donald Trump is another factor driving greater collaboration with Saudi Arabia. Despite Iran's special interest in economic and trade cooperation with Saudi Arabia, expanding cooperation to include the military dimension underscores the importance of regional security for both Saudi Arabia and Iran, as well as concerns about the impact of regional tensions on the security and stability of both countries.
