

Iran in a Week

Iran continues to grapple with a cycle of resilience and erosion as it enters a critical phase marked by neither open conflict with the West nor genuine reconciliation. Political leaders, including Ali Larijani and Masoud Pezeshkian, reflect a regime

attempting to project strategic stability while relying on fragile slogans and short-term policies. Nuclear negotiations, once seen as a path to salvation, are now bargaining tools amid shifting global alliances, necessary more for symbolic reasons than substantive outcomes. Inflation and economic grievances have shifted the crisis inward, exposing weakened infrastructure and declining social trust. Seeking economic lifelines, Tehran turns increasingly toward Russia and Pakistan, yet struggles to translate agreements into tangible gains.


